

Annual Report of the Chairperson of the Board and the Chief Executive Officer

And like Dorothy, the Five Counties Children's Centre was introduced to many new friends on our yellow brick road in 2016-2017. We were resourceful and we enjoyed significant success. Throughout the year we relied on interminable faith that we are heading towards a positive future.

Good things...

In September 2016 we celebrated our Medical Director, Dr. Mary Thain's 40th anniversary.

Dr. Mary Thain Site:

Dr. Thain has been the foundation of clinical excellence for the Centre for almost our entire history. The Board of Directors dedicated our Peterborough site - the Dr. Mary Thain site, in honour of her esteemed career.

Dr. Thain Bursary:

Dr. Thain was also recognized with the creation of the Dr. Thain bursary. The bursary will support one employee to participate in the American Academy of Cerebral Palsy and Developmental Medicine conference annually.

This bursary illustrates Dr. Thain's commitment to promoting excellence in health care. The Academy's mission is "to provide scientific education for health professionals and promote excellence in research and services for the benefit of people with, and at risk for, cerebral palsy and other childhoodonset disabilities"

New friends along the way...

- After 40 years Dr. Thain announced that she will be retiring. We were excited to successfully recruit a new Medical Director, Dr. Shelina Manji. Dr. Manji's initial career was as a speech language pathologist working at the Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital. She returned to the Hamilton Health Sciences for her medical degree, and subsequently began a career as a paediatrician in the United States. We look forward to welcoming Dr. Manji to our team in September 2017.
- In September 2016 we enjoyed a purple and yellow tornado that was the Smilezone team. After months of planning, the Smilezone team arrived one weekend and transformed 3 areas of the Dr. Mary Thain Site into bright, inviting, family friendly spaces.
- The Ministry of Children and Youth Services provided \$450,000 for leasehold improvements to a new rental location in Cobourg for our Northumberland Team. The team will be moving from our D'Arcy Street and Campbell Street sites into our more convenient, newly renovated space at 800 Division Street early in July 2017.
- We were sorry to say farewell to Brian Minaker after 23 years of service as our Manager of Finance and Administration. We are blessed to have Kerri Wellstood bring new energy and focus to our leadership team.

Resourceful...

This was our second year without an increase in funding. We continued to maintain our high level of service to children, youth and their families:

- 4,209 Number of children served
 — an increase of 200 children over the past year
- 34,454 Number of visits
- · Percentage served by age
 - 0-4: 1,559 (37%)
 - 5-14: 2,469 (59%)
 - 15-19: 180 (4%)
- 10 Number of placements created for speech, occupational, physio, and recreational therapy students, communication disorders assistant students, and social work students.
- 2,333 Hours employees were engaged in professional development.
- 832 Hours staff worked with community partners, sharing knowledge and experience to better help and serve our children and their families.

Significant Success...

One of our significant successes this year was the implementation of our Coordinated Service Planning model. Coordinated Service Planning connects families to the right services and supports. Families have asked all organizations to work together differently. Regardless of which organization an individual works for, families are asking us to work in collaboration as a cohesive team to support them. As the Lead Coordinating Agency we expanded our commitment to excellence to include our community

partners. Our community vision is to "work together as a seamless system."

This work has helped the Centre achieve our **strategic theme** to lead the way through innovation and promote a culture of excellence internally and in the community.

Coordinated Service Planning is aligned with our values. We believe in the importance of our communities and their role as key partners in enhancing the lives of our clients and their families.

We have been working with 22 community partners across 6 counties to begin to build a seamless system. Here is what our community partners told us about their experience with our Coordinated Service Planning model:

Annual Report of the Medical Director

I again appreciate the opportunity to present a report from the Medical Director to the annual general meeting of the corporation of Five Counties Children's Centre and Foundation. The quality of clinical work at Five Counties remains high.

Clinical services continue to be organized geographically, with the differing needs and demands in each site clearly dictated by the needs of those communities. Program Managers work diligently with their staff to ensure that all elements of the Quality Improvement Plan (QIP) are reflected in the practice of their staff, who meet regularly as discipline teams and interdisciplinary teams within their sites, and then in a larger Centre-wide format for approximately 5 days throughout the year.

The clinical direction of the Centre is determined by the Director of Clinical Services, in partnership with the Program Managers and the Advanced Practice Leaders, and with the oversight of the CEO. Five Counties Children's Centre continues to enjoy its reputation

for excellence and high quality services. Our commitment to the Commission on Accreditation for Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) aligns perfectly with our strategic plan, and our QIP has been developed to align with these strategic directions:

Help More Kids in More Ways

In our attempt to achieve equitable and timely access to services, we have introduced a new Clinical Schedule which determines the timing of assessment and treatment blocks throughout the year. The objective is to increase the amount of collaborative treatment and the number of group treatment sessions in an attempt to see children more efficiently, thereby decreasing wait times for both assessment and treatment.

To assist with efficiency, the Centre has recently been connected with OTN (Ontario Telemedicine Network) which will allow us to participate in clinics with other healthcare providers, without the need to travel. We have also acquired a more cost-effective secure video conferencing system which will allow us to connect across sites and with other non-OTN community partners. This will free up our therapists to spend more time on direct service to children. We acknowledge the efforts of our Manager of Finance and Administration for her diligence in investigating and sourcing affordable connectivity for us.

In an attempt to recognize the diversity of the children we treat, and support our staff to provide culturally competent services, our cultural diversity training this year focused on First Nations. Staff enjoyed a presentation by the Curve Lake First Nation Cultural Centre, and we will be pursuing additional training from the Nogojiwanong Native

Friendship Centre to assist us in enhancing the experience of Aboriginal children and families when they come to the Centre.

To increase staff awareness of the importance of recognizing self-regulation as a consideration in the planning of treatment and recommendations for some children, a workshop was presented by two of our occupational therapists to all staff in October 2016.

This year a new position was introduced in Northumberland County to support early learning programs and services. The Early Learning Community Quality Assurance Advisor Northumberland will research, develop, implement and sustain a county wide evaluation framework to promote quality in Early Learning Programs and Services provided in Northumberland County. In the fall of 2016, a comprehensive review of the Peterborough Special Needs Resourcing programs and services was undertaken in cooperation with the City of Peterborough. The resulting nine recommendations have been referred to a working group for the development of an implementation plan. In September 2016 the Preschool Consultation program, provided in partnership with Kinark Child and Family Services, was discontinued and a Preschool Consultant position was retained 'in-house'.

Lead the Way Through Innovation

The goal of Care Plans is to both address the documentation requirements of the Centre, OACRS, and Regulatory Colleges and to provide families with both a clear understanding of what their child is working on and a record of the progress their child is making. Under the direction of our Manager, Quality Performance, our Gold Care Lead, and our Advanced Practice Leaders. Five Counties Children's Centre is one of the leaders of the implementation of Care Plans across the province. The GoldCare team has been invited to both KidsAbility (Kitchener-Waterloo) and CTN (York Simcoe) to share their experiences and insights around the implementation and use of care plans.

Improve Outcomes for Children and Youth

We strive to both improve outcomes, and to measure them. Improving outcomes is ultimately connected to improving engagement and participation for families. This is intricately connected to our leadership and learning from Coordinated Service Planning, a process which emphasizes family-centeredness and family engagement. It challenges us to align clinical goals with the family's vision and design SMART (Specific, Measureable, Achievable, Realistic and Time-based) goals that reflect a family focus. To assist in this process, the Centre has hired an Advanced Practice Leader for Coordinated Service Planning (CSP), who is assisting in the development of the Single Plan of Care by supporting the identified community service planning coordinators through Phase One of CSP.

To improve staff confidence, skills and comfort in participating in family-led care, our staff and community partners have participated in extensive training in Solution-Focused Coaching. They will also be receiving training in the alignment of SMART goals with the family's vision for their child.

We have learned that one outcome

measure will not be sufficient to measure progress with all of our children. As a result we have developed a toolkit with a number of outcome measures, based on population.

Our Speech Language Pathologists Nolan and his Mom and Dad. continue to use the FOCUS (Focus on the Outcomes of Children Under Six) and our ABA (Applied Behavioural Analysis) teams use GAS (Goal Attainment Scaling) for these specific populations that dictate their use. In June, staff will be trained in the COPM (Canadian Occupational Performance Measure) which may be used across disciplines and with all ages, and more importantly is more family-centered. The AIMS (Alberta Infant Motor Scales) and PEM-CY (Participation and Environment Measure - Children and Youth) continue to be used as appropriate, and clinicians are also trialing new outcome measures developed by their disciplines. This is an ongoing process and we are making progress.

Improving outcomes and family experiences also means working in partnership with our community agencies to coordinate services. We continue to provide screening at the Neo-Natal Follow-Up Clinic at Peterborough Regional Health Centre (PRHC) and our social workers regularly attend the Complex Care Clinic, also at PRHC, to assist families in communicating their needs to the nurse practitioner from the Hospital for Sick Children. This means fewer trips to Toronto for our families. We are also working with PRHC to develop a more comprehensive feeding clinic and reduce duplication in our services.

Additional dollars have been made



available for the diagnosis of children with autism. We are part of the East Regional Group for this and Five Counties Children's Centre is considered a diagnostic hub. This means there is funding for more individuals to be trained in doing autism diagnosis and for social work support.

We continue to share orthopedic clinics with Grandview Children's Centre at Grandview. We now have one palato facial management clinic a year with outside consultants. We have obtained the services of a new dentist as Dr. Judith Buys who had been our dentist for many years died tragically last August. We have one Spina Bifida Clinic per year but as there are fewer children requiring this service, we include a number of other children with unrelated orthopedic problems.

I find it difficult to express my appreciation to staff, board members and families in an appropriate way. I am retiring as of September and a new Medical Director has been appointed. I have been extremely fortunate to have had this position. I have had significant cooperation from administrative, secretarial, therapy, staff, and families.

Annual Report of the Executive Director

FCCC Foundation

Five Counties Children's Centre Foundation achieved respectable operating results for 2016-2017 in the face of heightened donor fatigue. The new player on the scene, contributing to this fatigue, is crowdfunding. Although the idea of crowdfunding is not new, the internet has created a platform for anyone to raise funds for anything, with no checks or balances as to whether the funds were ever used for their advertised purpose.

Crowdfunding is the practice of funding a project or venture by raising monetary contributions from a large number of people. Crowdfunding is a form of crowdsourcing and of alternative finance. It has become so popular and large that it is now referred to as an "industry" and has its own association. Go Fund Me is the largest in terms of revenue.

In spite of this new competition the Foundation exceeded budgeted donation and fundraising income by approximately \$140,000. Expenses were held in check, coming in under budget by \$9,000. The Five Counties Children's Centre requires annual funding from the Foundation to support the therapy needs of approximately 450 children, who could lose their therapy if these annual funds aren't raised. The Foundation's financial strength is attributed to having loyal donors who give annually, good public recognition of the work being done and that funds raised help local children.

Marketing continues to play a large part in the successes of the organization. A decision was made to strengthen this area through the creation of a Marketing Committee. One of the goals of the committee is to increase the visibility of the Foundation through the creation of a website, versus being a tab on the Centre's website. Social media will be used to drive traffic to the site, where stories will demonstrate how Five Counties is making a difference in the lives of the families we serve. A content calendar is being developed, that will be used to increase the profile of events we generate revenue from as well as increase exposure of the various disciplines at Five Counties.


