The Annual General Report is usually a look back at all the accomplishments, milestones and challenges we had throughout the previous fiscal year. This past year will be one that we look back on frequently for many years to come. On March 15th, 2020, for the first time in the organization's 45 years, we had to temporarily close our doors to children and families. While the doors of our physical buildings were closed, the need didn't stop. Our staff pivoted, embracing technology and developed innovative ways to provide the necessary services during the pandemic.

Prior to the last two weeks of March it was a great year for Five Counties. As with every year there were many noteworthy accomplishments and though it isn't possible to capture them all, here are some of the highlights ...

Staff and families alike were thrilled with the **update to our Lindsay**

location in March 2019. The renovation which included a fun underwater mural and increased accessibility in our reception and waiting areas, made our entrance more welcoming and friendly – just how we like to greet everyone when they visit us. Our renovations were made possible through a grant from the Government of Canada Enabling Accessibility Fund.

One year later, we were happy to celebrate the Grand Opening of our latest Smilezone at our Cobourg location generously donated by the Smilezone Foundation and additional Northumberland community supporters. The beautiful murals reflecting our neighbouring farm communities, famous beaches, rolling hills and the Ganaraska Forest feature dozens of local animals, which help kids work on their language skills and open the possibilities for an Eye Spy treasure hunt! The Smilezone also includes toys and other kid-friendly activities meant to help improve the experience for children and families when they visit our children's treatment centre.

Information Technology

Through good planning in April of 2019 there was a restructuring of the **Information Technology department**



which brought our IT services internal. Little did we know how important this decision would be.

- Movement to MS Office 365
 early in April 2019 helped us
 to improve our security for our
 communication internally and
 with families.
- With the COVID-19 pandemic and the move to close the Centre, all staff who were identified as requiring a computer to complete their work, left the building with the equipment that they required.
- MS Teams was available immediately for staff as a means of videoconference with colleagues, clients and their families, as well as community partners.
- Within one week of moving offsite, staff resources, including MS SharePoint, were moved to the Cloud to make them available to staff so they could continue their work while away from the Centre.

Improve Outcomes for Children and Youth

We continued creating, developing and embracing initiatives throughout the year that aligned with our value to Improve the Outcomes of Children and Youth:

Speech Language Pathology
Pilot Program which streamlined
children according to their identified

needs to the best evidence-based intervention.

Bridges Out of Poverty Working Group was developed to advise on service planning, customer service, policies and procedures and changes to process to reflect and support the life cycle and hidden rules experienced by poverty.

Services Planning Sessions were introduced with all families, to provide families with a non-threatening opportunity to understand their child's assessment results, complete outcome measures, contribute to goals, and collaborate with their clinicians to determine the plan which best suits their schedule and their child's needs.

Peterborough School Based Rehabilitation Services was successfully transitioned from existing contracted service providers in January for Speech and Language Therapy. This added an additional 6.6 staff to the Five Counties' Team.

Shorelines Casino





Have you met Scott?

Just a month before his second birthday, Scott discovered the freedom of walking on his own, thanks to a mini walker built just for him. Six months later he took his first steps without it.

While Scott has worked really hard to get to this point, his parents understand how fortunate they are to have the right team of therapists to support him.

Scott was born with a severe form of Cornelia de Lange Syndrome. Most kids with the same condition cannot even sit up yet. "They are not expected to walk until age four to six, if they live that long,' says his mother Joanna. "Yet our determined little boy does front rolls at his gymnastics class every week. He may be small, but no one should underestimate him."

"My family and I see so many children coming into Five Counties' waiting room with questions – like we had. It's even harder for those whose children remain on the waiting list, hoping for that call to come and meet the kind and insightful staff who will show them how to help their child. I cannot imagine where we would be without the team who helped Scott," stated Joanna.

Scott started coming to Five Counties when he was a week old, so he could learn to eat without choking. His syndrome is characterized by slow growth which makes him short for his age with four fingers on one hand. His physiotherapist worked on Scott's balance as he was learning to sit up and crawl. She also suggested adding a strap inside his walker to give him more stability and more confidence.

"He was cheered on in the hallways by staff as he zipped from room to room, with a big smile on his face. Only my grin was wider. He made me so proud," says Joanna. "Next, we plan to have him compete in a children's triathlon alongside our two daughters. After all, we want him to have the same opportunities our daughters will have. It's great to see him as a typical two-year-old. Now we are getting to see what he's capable of and he's so happy!"
